UNIVERSITY ARCHIVES & SPECIAL COLLECTIONS

University Archives

The UASC moniker reflects a renewed emphases on documenting the institutional memory of UPEI, and its forebears, St. Dunstan's University (SDU) and Prince of Wales College (PWC). This becomes more important and more challenging as the university continues to expand, innovate, and age, and we continue working towards a formalized and coordinated recorded information management (RIM) programme for UPEI.

We continue, as well, to grow our collection of UPEI-related publications, documents, photos, and memorabilia, and to work at making this collection more accessible. We are delighted to announce, for example, the recently-completed of digitization of the full 60 years (1909 - 1969) of the SDU magazine, *The Red & White.* We also recently completed, with the UPEI Art Committee, an inventory of artwork on campus, which will be available online soon.

Special Collections

Our main special collection is the PEI Collection, mandated to acquire all Island-related publications, and we are continually adding to the approximattely 14,000 book, periodical, and audiovisual titles already in our holdings. This includes a wealth of material from PEI's most famous author, L.M. Montgomery, and we have shared these riches with hundreds of visitors from around the world during the 2008 *Anne* centennial.

As with the Archives, digitization is a key part of our efforts to better share the PEI Collection's riches. The Library digitation lab has, for example, recently completed work on a full digital archive of *The Island Magazine* (1976 - present).

Library catalogue: Evergreen

On June 5th, the Library migrated its existing SIRSI system to an open-source system named *Evergreen* for managing its in-house collection resources – such as books, DVDs, scores, etc. Using open-source software gives us direct access to the developers and the programming innards of the system and staff here have already contributed software enhancements, thereby benefitting all Evergreen users. Robertson Library was the first academic university in the world to adopt this open-source system.

RIRI Institute: Another first! The Library hosted the first Red Island Repository Institute (RIRI) in August. It was a five day hands-on Fedora course (Aug. 11-15) and Fedora gurus Sandy Payette (Fedora Commons Executive Director), Richard Green (Manager, RIDIR, REMAP and RepoMMan Projects, e-SIG, Academic Services, university of Hull), and Mat Zumwalt (MediaShelf) guided the event.



Digital Collections: We rolled out our new **Digitization Facility** this year. We bought a new overhead scanner (one of just four in Canada) which will allow us to digitize oversized books and other documents. The Library already has a 3-D scanner used to digitize lobster necropsies for the Atlantic Veterinary College. Kris Bulman is working full-time on our digitization projects. Special digitization projects (http://www.islandarchives.ca/) included:

• *A Living Archives* – a collaborative arrangement with other Island agencies to deliver historical documents and provide a authoring environment for grade 7 students to create

stories about life on P.E.I. at the turn of the 20th century. This project, jointly funded by Heritage Canada and Canadian Culture Online programme (CCOP), was launched a the end of May.

• *Island Voices* and *Island Lives* continued to develop – digitizing P.E.I. oral history and community histories, respectively.

• The *Island Magazine* was fully digitized by the end December and made available online for access (1976 - present) and the full 60 years of the SDU magazine, *The Red & White*, were digitized as well.

Virtual reference online software changed from CraftySyntax to LibrayH3lp – allowing us to embed a *chat widget* in our website home-page, improving the accessibility and presence of our virtual Ask Us reference service. Statistics indicated that these changes resulted in a tenfold increase of use.

SMART Boards – This technology was introduced into two of the Library's group study rooms.

LIBRARY EVENTS

Race About Charlottetown: Also in August, the Library was a very active participant in the Annual Race About Charlottetown – a fund-raiser organized by the PEI branch of the Kidney Foundation.

SeaWords Creative Writing Workshop: On August 18, 2008, the L.M. Montgomery Institute (LMMI) hosted the SeaWords Creative Writing workshop at Shaw's Hotel. Writers Anne Simpson, Anne-Marie MacDonald, and Jackie Kaiser provided some instruction and inspiration.

Library Booksale

We held a very successful used book sale in September 2008. Proceeds from the sale were shared with the U.P.E.I. Business Society. Books, ranging from popular novels through nonfiction and textbooks, were eagerly picked up at bargain prices.

Library Art Competiton 2007-8 Unveiling

The winning art competiton submission was offically unveiled on September 26, 2008 at the Library. An invitation to the event went out to the campus community and the general public and people came to see the installed exhibit and meet the artist, Gerald Beaulieu.

Launch of IslandScholar Repository

In December, the Office of the Vice-President of Research & Development and the Library jointly launched the IslandScholar repository as an open-source alternative – providing more accessibility to faculty publications. Website address is <u>www.IslandScholar.ca</u>
